Land trust group takes on a cleanup

GREAT BARRINGTON — Susan Witt, a vital member of the Community Land Trust of South Berkshire, believes that if an organization is going to advocate sensible land use, the land it owns better be usable as well.

That's why the members of the land trust and a group of volunteers are cleaning up a small portion of the bank of the Housatonic River just behind the land trust offices on Main Street. The land, on the west bank of the river, is owned by the organization, a non-profit group that advocates and constructs housing that is inexpensive and environmentally sound.

"We intended this when we bought the property in 1977," said land trust Treasurer Rachel Fletcher, who is coordinating the effort. "But we couldn't think about cleaning the property until we cleaned up our own back yard."

The banks of the river behind Main Street have long been a changing ground for a starting collection of debris. So far, the list of items found on the strip behind the land trust office includes bricks, concrete blocks, wooden logs and boards, masonry, rusty metal appliances, bottles, glasses and even an old bedpost. A few weeks ago, on his cross-state trip via the riverway, Stockbridge resident Dennis Chang declared this stretch of the Housatonic to be one of the ugliest in the state.

"It's pretty bad," she said. "It's more like a dump than a river."

Witt said the organization was going to have a cleanup crew do the work but decided, particularly after hearing the estimates, to get volunteers to do the work.

Fletcher said the volunteers will break up the rubble and separate the metal and other materials that can be recycled. The bank will be smoothed over and covered with wood chips, topsoil and mulch, several types of concrete blocks.

The work will be done in a buffer between the river and the work. Fletcher said the organization was going to have a cleanup crew do the work but decided, particularly after hearing the estimates, to get volunteers to do the work.

Fletcher said the volunteers will break up the rubble and separate the metal and other materials that can be recycled. The bank will be smoothed over and covered with wood chips, topsoil and mulch, several types of concrete blocks.

Concert series planned in Otis by Arts Council and Feldman

OTIS — The Otis Arts Council and Edgar S. Feldman are looking to bring a water music series to the town.

The series will begin with a concert by the Shantel String Quartet Oct. 15 at the First Congregational Church, depending on the success of that concert. Terry C. Boney, chairman of the arts council, said the other performances will be held in the church.

Feldman, a resident of Otis and New York City who plans to co-sponsor the "Concert Party" series formerly held at the Berkshire School in Sheffield.

The arts council is in charge of distributing state grant money to local artists. It also operates an art exhibition at the Otis Library and holds a summer arts fair.

According to Boney, the music series will be held in Otis because of the town's proximity to the Shantel String Quartet.

Boney said he never expected the desire to begin a concert series. "The last time I saw the Otis Library was before I left Otis."

At the same art exhibition was the Rev. John W. McCannery, who gave his blessing for the use of the First Congregational Church, which seats about 200, as a concert hall. Boney then obtained approval from the arts council, and the show was on.

Feldman operates a New York City insurance agency and has lived a part time in Berkshire County for many years.
